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INTRODUCTION

Chris is studying the role of dinosaurs in our culture. Each project in this series approaches this subject from a different angle. *Casting Call* seeks to learn more about how we perceive dinosaurs as having personalities.

Methodology

Chris gave the participants a choice of movies they could recast with an all dinosaur cast. The idea was to figure out which dinosaurs would do the best job playing each of the movie's characters. In other words, what dinosaur would give the most convincing performance as Han Solo, the Stay-Puft Marshmallow Man, or Snow White?

The participants could choose any dinosaur to play the parts; they did not have to choose from a pre-selected group. They could do any or all of the movies.

The first set of the participants did the project in person, on paper, as with most of Chris' projects.

Later, Chris sent the files to a group of people over the web. This is one of the few projects of this kind that Chris has done over the internet. This had the interesting and unintended effect of allowing the participants to do their own internet research on the dinosaurs and the characters, which led to a much more diverse group of dinosaurs, many of which were very obscure, and also led to some very nuanced pairings of dinosaurs and movie characters, as will be described later. At first Chris worried that, without him there to talk to the participants, the project would be taken too lightly. Instead, it had the opposite effect, and was a very positive development.

The final group of participants completed their forms on paper at an installation Chris set up at a distant university art exhibition, which he did not have a chance to visit in person. These people thus participated without Chris' direct guidance much like the internet participants, but without the opportunity to do internet research for their answers on the spot. Nonetheless, at least some of the responses showed a high degree of knowledge of obscure extinct life forms, which means that these participants were either very well-versed themselves (and were perhaps faculty or students in a science department at the university), or that they saw the project, went away and did some research, and then came back to the gallery to complete it. Either way, it once again proved to be a fortuitous method for harvesting interesting casting decisions.

These last two methods of participation make *Casting Call* stand out among the other projects in this series.

Objectives

This project is intended to investigate the way we perceive dinosaurs to have personalities, or at the very least, personas. Clearly, in popular culture, certain dinosaurs usually play certain roles, whether it is in a cartoon or a horror movie--the tyrannosaurus is rarely the good guy, for instance (with some exceptions).

The reasons for this are complex and only partly understood. Partly it is based on the animals' natural size and shape and characteristics, partly it is based on the momentum of early cultural instances of dinosaur stories and images, partly it is our own psyches in search of pattern and identification in the world.

In other words, we may partly be picking up on real behavior-derived personas, and we may partly be projecting ourselves on them, as a sort of tabula rasa wiped clean by many millions of years.

In any case, it would be helpful to better understand how specifically these putative dinosaur personalities can be pinned down . By matching them up with well-known characters, we can learn a bit more about them.

The following sections of this book provide the original data supplied through the experiment, then analyze that data for answers to the above questions.

The Original Forms

These are the forms the participants were given to fill out.

They could choose to do any of the movies they wished, and could write in any dinosaur names they wished.

The movies were chosen based on two main priorities: that they have a number of well-defined characters who often fulfill some sort of dramatic stereotype, and that the movies represent a wide range of movie genres--romantic comedy, action, animation, western, sci-fi, etc.

Their characters similarly should include a range of roles--naive hero, antihero, megalomaniac villain, tricky villain, friend, fool, and so on.

Diversity in gender and ethnicity was also a priority, to see if people made different choices based on those characteristics.





If a space is left blank, it is because the participant left it blank.



Breakdown of the Results



The following pages show four graphs dealing with the number of uniquely-named dinosaurs in the project.


The first pair looks at the ratio and absolute numbers of uniquely-named dinosaurs within the context of each movie individually.


They create a ratio between (and show the absolute numbers of) the number of species that were listed *more than once for a particular movie*, against the number of species that were *only listed once for that movie*.

The second pair of graphs does the same thing, except that instead of looking at species that were named only once within a particular movie, it looks at species that were named only once within the entire project. In other words, within each particular movie, it compares the species that *were named more than once anywhere in the project* against those species that *were completely unique and never mentioned elsewhere in the project*.

The point is to see which movies had the greatest amount of speciation--the greatest number of species total, and the greatest number of unusual species within that total.


*Percentage of Characters

Full Roster*






In this graph, "Unique Species" is defined as species that were only named once in each particular movie, but may have been named for other movies.

Analysis of Results

This was possibly the most complex and fascinating project of the series. It has less data per category than the others, leaving its conclusions somewhat unresolved, but it shows expansive and deep potential.

The Movies

The most popular movies for participants to fill out were:

Star Wars: 15

Ghost Busters: 11

Casablanca and *Snow White and the Seven Dwarves*: 8

Little Miss Sunshine: 7

Pulp Fiction: 6

Jurassic Park and *The Princess Bride*: 5

Thelma and Louise and *Unforgiven*: 3

This more or less falls into line with Chris' predictions at the outset, based on the general popularity of the movies among the people that were likely to participate in the project. *Casablanca* and *Little Miss Sunshine* had more participants than expected, and *Pulp Fiction* had less. The movies were chosen to appeal to different demographics, as well as to represent a wide spectrum of movie genres. Most importantly, however, they each included a number of diverse characters that nonetheless fit into a movie archetype of some kind.

For instance, *Pulp Fiction* is a character-based crime movie with multiple black and female characters, as well as multiple *pairs* of characters whose relationship may inform the choice of what dinosaur might play them. For instance, both Honey Bunny and Pumpkin might be cast with the same, or similar, dinosaurs.

Only the main characters were included on the forms, in part because they are the most detailed and thus provide a greater basis on which to make a casting decision, and in part

because it was necessary to choose characters that the participants would be able to remember.

The Dinosaur Index

The participants chose a total of 95 different dinosaurs to play parts in the movies.

Their diversity and obscurity is impressive. Their choices add weight to the notion that they were taking the project seriously. Otherwise, there would be no need to have, for example, 13 different kinds of large theropods, including such specific and unusual dinosaurs as *Rugops*, *Rajasaurus*, and *Guanlong*.

Similarly, there are 10 types of ceratopsians, 10 sauropods, 5 dromaeosaurs, 7 bird-like dinosaurs, 6 pterosaurs, and 11 ornithopods, just to give a few examples. Chris originally expected a few examples of each at most (*Zuniceratops*? *Pelorosaurus*? *Bambiraptor*? *Protarchaeopteryx*? *Dimorphodon*? *Altirhinus*?)

Some people intentionally or inadvertently left blanks on their forms. A few wrote in intentionally silly responses. Almost all of these were for *Star Wars*, *Snow White and the Seven Dwarves*, and *Pulp Fiction*. Sometimes these intentionally nonsensical responses have been included in the results in this book, but usually they have been left out in favor of "good faith" answers. A few participants gave answers that were not dinosaurs (or reptiles that lived at the time of the dinosaurs like pterosaurs or ichthyosaurs), but were extinct animals of some sort. A few of these were included in the Dinosaur Index (see below), but most were not. Chris used his discretion as to whether or not to include them in each graph or table, depending on the internal logic of each graph or table and the thoughtfulness of the answer. For instance,

“dodo” was rarely used, since it is from a very different time, is only distantly related to the dinosaurs, and was not cast because Victor Laszlo is particularly dodo-like. “Anomalocaris,” on the other hand, is a very thoughtful choice, relating to the Gimp’s anomalous appearance and persona, and comes from a time period that, at least in most American minds, is similarly primeval to the dinosaurs (even if it is actually much older).

The Characters

It seems like most participants were sincere in providing their responses and thought carefully about each dinosaur they chose. However, due to the complexities of the characters, the fact that everyone is going to understand the characters in a different way, and the fact that people have different levels of knowledge and understanding of dinosaurs, sometimes the aggregated casting decisions don’t seem to provide a clear picture as to how the dinosaurs represent the characters. This might change with more data, or it may be philosophically unresolvable.

This factor is a little different from *Dinosaur High School*, which otherwise is very similar to this project. In *Dinosaur High School*, we are dealing with pure abstractions, not specific examples of actual nerds, jocks, or goths; while in *Casting Call*, we are dealing with fictional, but concrete characters--characters that furthermore that exist over time, so one participant might be thinking about a character late in its life while another thinks about the character as a youth, etc.

The casting decisions are analyzed below. Analyses have only been provided for those characters for whom the casting decisions make some kind of reasonably clear statement or pattern. Those characters whose casting choices do not create clear patterns are interesting in themselves--what is it about

them that makes them less “castable” than the others? Is it an ambiguity in their character, or it is just that there doesn’t happen to be an analogous dinosaur for their character?

Casablanca

Rick Blaine: 3 of his 8 responses are Stegosaurus. This seems like a clear pattern--very specific, not just, for instance, 3 thyreophorans. However, as will be seen below, Stegosaurus is a dinosaur with very ambiguous meanings. This instance could actually provide one of its most clear references--that Rick is “prickly,” like the Stegosaurus’ tail. A bit of a long shot interpretations, but possible. It could also refer to a bit of slowness on his part; several of his other dinosaurs are also somewhat slow or dim-witted. They also tend to be plant-eaters, but most could (including the Stegosaurus) put up a good fight.

Ilsa Lund: Three of her responses are duckbill dinosaurs, and two more are sauropods, giving an overall sense that she is somewhat defenseless. The casting of the plesiosaurus with its long elegant neck, the parasaurolophuses with their crest, and Protarchaeopteryx with its plumage, could be a reference to female decorative sensibilities or aesthetics.

Victor Laszlo: 3 of his 8 responses are Apatosaurus, two are plesiosaurus, and two are pterosaurs. This is one of those odd situations where there is clearly a pattern, but it is not obvious why. An Apatosaurus might be associated with physical size, with age (as seen in some characters below), or with gentleness perhaps, but none of these characteristics seem to match him. One insight from *Dinosaur High School* (abbreviated as *DHS* from this point onward) is that a sauropod may be thought of as a snob, looking down on us from great heights. The idea of a plesiosaurus looking down from its similarly long neck, and of a pterosaur looking down from

the skies, seems to support this notion.

Sam: 2 of his responses are Dimetrodon. Two is not a particularly high number, but there were not a lot of Dimetrodons listed in this project, so it seems worth noting. The choice again seems a bit odd--Sam is hardly a ferocious meat eater, for instance. However, if we look to *DHS*, the Dimetrodon can be seen as a Theater Kid, someone who is dramatic and exhibitionist because of his ostentatious sail. The rest of his entries are unusually mixed--two sauropods, a pterosaur, a small theropod, a large theropod, and a Triceratops--suggesting that people had a hard time making up their minds about who Sam really is.

Major Strasser: 3 Tyrannosaurs and 2 Velociraptors play this complex antagonist character, along with 2 Triceratops. The Tyrannosaurus and Velociraptor tend to be used for very different kinds of characters in this project, with the Tyrannosaurus projecting a sense of majesty and power and immensity, while the Velociraptor is more conniving and quick. Normally they don't both fit a character, but in this case it makes sense. The Triceratops support the idea of dignity (or at least pretended dignity) and capacity for violence.

Ugarte: Played by 6 *different* meat-eating dinosaurs, including Compsognathus (small and weasel-y), Plesiosaurus (snake-like neck), Oviraptor (raptor=thief), Dakosaurus (a dangerous fish), Velociraptor (vicious), and Dimetrodon (ostentatious), all the characteristics of which fit him well.

Ghost Busters

Peter Venkman: 7 of his 11 dinosaurs are fairly tough meat- and plant-eaters: Ichthyosaurus, Dimetrodon, Deinonychus, Pteranodon, Plesiosaurus, and Tyrannosaurus among the meat eaters, and the battling Triceratops and Stegosaurus

for plant-eaters. All together, a very rough slate; one participant labelled him as an alpha male, always bristling, and this comes through in the casting; but where is his sense of humor?

Raymond Stantz: 4 Triceratops, 3 Stegosaurus, and 2 large sauropods--a lot of repetition in different species, but all plant-eaters. They imply strength as well. Stantz is the Ghost Buster in the middle--smart like Spengler, but wild like Venkman, and this variety seems to be getting at that complexity. The repetition, and the similarity of the repeated species, signal some inner truths of his character--a less aggressive, but still formidable, character than Venkman.

Egon Spengler: 2 Ichthyosaurs and 2 Parasaurolophuses. All of his 11 options are either plant eaters or at least skinny and a little odd looking--even the meat eaters (ichthyosaurus, plesiosaurus, and pteranodon) are outsiders in the dinosaur world. Meganuera is a particularly interesting choice; it is a large extinct dragonfly whose name means "large nerved" and certainly has all the characteristics of this flighty and odd character.

Winston Zeddemore: Like Stantz, he has a lot of repetition but also a lot of variation: 2 Triceratops, 2 Apatosaurs, 2 Ankylosaurus, and 2 Dimetrodons. As with Stantz' case, the variation is more on the surface than in the depth; each of these species conveys strength and hardness, albeit with slightly different overtones.

Dana Barrett: 2 Velociraptors, a Deinonychus, a Dimetrodon, a Plesiosaurus, and a Therizinosaur, all of which are tough and dangerous. Out of all the women characters, she was cast with the toughest dinosaurs. This is possibly because of her character, which constantly spars with Venkman, and also

because she turns into the evil dog monster!

Louis Tully: Several silly dinosaurs like Hadrosaurus, Parasaurolophus, and Corythosaurus, plus small or fragile-looking ones like Compsognathus, Pterodactyl, Ornithomimus, and Protoceratops, as well as one with a silly name, Nqwebasaurus, all come together to create a full portrait of his ridiculous and diminutive character.

Janine Melnitz: If there is anyone who doesn't believe in the basic premise of this project, let them only look here, at the two separate castings of Zuniceratops for Janine Melnitz. This is a totally obscure dinosaur, chosen, as one participant told Chris, because it was out of the ordinary, small, and non-threatening. For two people to have hit on this random dinosaur for such a minor character is amazing. Some of her other dinosaurs are more random-seeming, but generally they support a small (Compsognathus), odd (Oviraptor), and harmless, talkative (Parasaurolophus) character--but with a flash of honest ire (Deinonychus!).

Walter Peck: 5 Velociraptors, a Deinonychus, a Tyrannosaurus, and a Cryolophosaurus make up a very ferocious group of dinosaurs for this mean-spirited and self-centered character. The Velociraptors seem most appropriate; he is sneaky rather than direct. He is one of the most clearly and consistently cast characters in the list, second only to Darth Vader.

The Mayor: 4 sauropods and 2 ankylosaurs. This seems to be based on his strength and power, and perhaps a bit of slow-wittedness. It is interesting that sauropods tend to be applied to roles of "elders" or those whose power comes from their position, rather than those whose power is personal, who are often cast as Tyrannosaurs. This implies an interesting difference in the way we see these dinosaurs: the sauropods as

authority figures, the Tyrannosaurs on the outside.

Stay-Puft Marshmallow Man: 4 Tyrannosaurs, 3 Giganotosaurs, a Lukousaurus, and an Apatosaurus clearly create a message of monstrosity and power. Giganotosaurus is a candidate for the largest meat-eating dinosaur, and was only used for the Marshmallow Man, so it provides a clear example of how the participants chose their dinosaurs very carefully.

Jurassic Park

Ellie Sattler: 2 ceratopsians and an Archelon (a turtle) could be seen as reflecting a character that is a strong protector, and the Maiasaura focuses this defense to her young.

John Hammond: 2 Apatosaurs and a Brachiosaurus. As mentioned, there is an association of sauropods, and especially Apatosaurs, with older characters and authority figures, which probably derives from a connection between size and great age.

Ian Malcolm: Therizinosaurus, Guanlong, and Troodon are all formidable opponents, although Troodon is much smaller than the others; the Therizinosaurus and Struthiomimus are also a bit awkwardly shaped, like the stoop-shouldered character.

Robert Muldoon: Troodon, Velociraptor, and Dimetrodon are all hunters, but do not necessarily get across the exact nature of his character; the Allosaurus seems to be the perfect fit. All in all, a very clear portrait of a capable warrior.

Lex and Tim Murphy: Both siblings were cast as Oviraptors by one participant and as Protoceratops by another participant, clear examples of how people chose their dinosaurs carefully and with consideration of the characters' overall

personalities and context. Oviraptors and Maiasaura are popular choices for female characters. Troodon, Gallimimus, and Archaeopteryx are all small and thin dinosaurs. Protoceratops are not thin, but seem to be seen as the paragon of small and/or defenseless characters, and are often cast for young, diminutive, or female characters.

Donald Gennaro: This lawyer is represented by Hadrosaurus and Iguanodon, two somewhat silly dinosaurs, as well as the small and helpless Compsognathus.

Tyrannosaurus: The Tyrannosaurus in the movie is cast with a Tyrannosaurus, indicating that no one else but a T. rex could possibly fill its shoes, as well as 2 Allosaurs and an Albertosaurus, both of which are smaller, but still fierce, theropods. Albertosaurus is specifically a kind of Tyrannosauridae. It was also cast with an Iguanodon, which is possibly a putdown at its expense, since that same participant cast the Velociraptors in the movie with a Tyrannosaurus.

Velociraptor: Dilophosaurus, Tyrannosaurus, and 3 Utahrap-tors. Both the Dilophosaurus and the Utahrap-tors are actually about the size of the Velociraptors in the movie, which are portrayed at a larger scale than real Velociraptors.

Little Miss Sunshine

Olive Hoover: 4 flying reptiles--Pterodactyl, Pteranodon, Microraptor, and Archaeopteryx--possibly because of her soaring career and goals and 4 small ones for her short stature--Compsognathus, plus the Pterodactyl, Archaeopteryx, and especially the Microraptor.

Dwayne Hoover: 2 Velociraptors and 2 Apatosaurs; the Velociraptors could signal his interest in the military, but the Apatosaurs are unclear.

Grandpa Edwin Hoover: Two sauropods and a Tyrannosaurus, signalling age and authority with an edge--which is supplemented by the Velociraptor; the 2 Stegosaur and the Triceratops could further reference his prickliness.

Sheryl Hoover: Maiasaura and Oviraptors are often used for women characters; the lack of a consensus for the rest of her casting choices could mean that it was easier to define her character through her gender than through her personality.

Frank Ginsberg: Two Triceratops and a Therizinosaurus, both of which have long thin protrusions, which could stand for the blades he would have used in his suicide attempt--see the Jody and Lance characters in *Pulp Fiction* for more in this line. A very interesting example of how the dinosaurs' physical characteristics can come in to play.

The Princess Bride

Grandson: Two Protoceratops, which are often used for small children. As with Sheryl Hoover, the lack of consensus otherwise may indicate that his character is not very clear and that it was easiest to reference his age and size than his personality.

Grandfather: 3 Apatosaurs, once again standing in for an older character.

Westley: The Dimetrodon, Carnotaurus, Pteranodon, and Velociraptor indicate his warrior abilities, and the last 3 could mirror his agility.

Buttercup: Many female characters have either Oviraptor, Maiasaura, or Protoceratops; she has all three.

Vizzini: 2 Compsognathuses clearly represent his small size;

and the Velociraptor and Ramphorhynchus may do the same.

Inigo Montoya: 3 Velociraptors and an Allosaurus. This is a very interesting example where Velociraptors, which normally stand for evil, are used for an ultimately good character. See also Han Solo. All of them keenly represent his fighting ability.

Fezzik: 2 Brachiosaurs and 2 Argentinosaurus, all representing his great height and strength, with the Ankylosaurus also indicating the latter. Argentinosaurus are often considered one of the largest sauropods, so their choice is more specific than simply casting any random large dinosaur.

Prince Humperdinck: A mix of predators, although without a real connection between them--Tyrannosaurus, Therizinosaur, Compsognathus, Dimetrodon, and Ichthyosaurus. As the clearly-defined bad guy in this movie, it is surprising he doesn't have a more focused set of dinosaurs.

Pulp Fiction

Vincent Vega: 3 Velociraptors, a Utahraptor, a Deinonychus, and an Allosaurus. All fierce fighters, cold-blooded, but not as tough as a Tyrannosaurus. Another difference between the casting of Velociraptors and Tyrannosaurs could be that more intelligent (and thus human-like) Velociraptors seem to be seen as hunters for hire, as with these the *Pulp Fiction* killers and Han Solo, as opposed to Tyrannosaurs, which are more of a force of nature. It is a bit surprising to see the ferocity of the dinosaurs cast for Vega and Winnfield, since their sense of humor is also very much on display. However, all put together, this is a very consistent set of dinosaurs--there is some variation, but it's all within the same theme.

Jules Winnfield: 2 Velociraptors, a Deinonychus, an Ovirap-

tor, and a Ceratosaurus. Very similar to Vega, but with some differences. It is perhaps most helpful to compare how each participant cast the one and the other. One participant cast them both as Velociraptors and another cast them both as Deinonychus, which implies that they were essentially the same character. Another participant listed Vega as a Utahraptor and Winnfield as a Velociraptor, implying that Vega is the more powerful of the two. Another listed Vega as a Velociraptor and Winnfield as an Oviraptor, which is a bit of an odd choice--it shares the "raptor" name but isn't really in the same family. Yet another cast Vega as an Allosaurus and Winnfield as a Ceratosaurus, which once again gives Vega the larger-sized animal. This is odd, because Winnfield would seem to be the fiercer of the two hitmen. One participant, who only filled out part of his form, cast Vega as a Velociraptor but left Winnfield blank. Altogether, this pairing provides one of the more interesting comparisons between two similar characters. It seems to show that they are cast for their roles (hitmen), rather than their interior narrative (one of which has a romantic interlude, one of which is repentant, etc.).

Butch Coolidge: Deinonychus, Spinosaurus, and Tyrannosaurus are all tough, but they imply very different forms of fighting, from the relatively small Deinonychus to the weak-jawed Spinosaurus and the ultimate tough guy, Tyrannosaurus. Two Ankylosaurs further add to the "tough" bandwagon, with a bit of a defensive posture, but the Pachycephalosaurus is perhaps the key--the literal "hard headed" dinosaur that keeps butting its head up against the wall.

Fabienne: Several small or thin dinosaurs of varying ferocity: Compsognathus, Maiasaura, Caudipteryx, Dromaeosaurus, and Velociraptor. The ferocity is interesting because she is never very violent in the film.

Mia Wallace: A very unusual 2 Therizinosaurs, plus a Coelophysid and two large pterosaurs. This seems to imply a certain swiftness but also awkwardness, perhaps after overdosing.

Marsellus Wallace: Along with the obvious 3 Tyrannosaurs, Allosaurus (which seems small for a character that is so large), and Futalognkosaurus (a large sauropod), there is the thoughtfully-cast Rajasaurus, a large theropod whose name means “king,” which is very apt for the character. This is a good example of how Tyrannosaurs tend to be applied to characters that are forces of nature, and whose power comes from themselves rather than inherited positions within a hierarchy.

Honey Bunny and Pumpkin: 2 Compsognathuses, a Synsaurus, which is similar, and two ceratopsians. Pumpkin has one Compsognathus, which is paired with one of Honey Bunny's, a Velociraptor, which is paired with her Triceratops, and 2 Styracosaurus, which is an odd choice, but one of them is paired with Honey Bunny's Torosaurus, which makes more sense as a pair. He has the more violent dinosaurs between the two of them, which makes sense, since he is the one to brandish the gun. The use of ceratopsians here doesn't make as much sense as it does for others; they tend to be used for dignified characters, or large, slow ones, and occasionally their spikes are related to their storyline (see Jody, below). Honey Bunny and Pumpkin are small and wiry and anything but dignified; perhaps their bristly personas bring up the association with the horns, or as even more of a longshot, perhaps their sexual energy is being punned with “horny”?

Maynard: The pattern behind his casting choices is not as clear as some others, but is interesting to note for two esoteric choices: Chirostenotes, a kind of oviraptor, and

Hyaenodon, a dog-like animal with Hyena-esque teeth that lived long after the dinosaurs. Along with the Deinonychus, it certainly paints a violent, somewhat debased picture, but less so than Zed.

Zed: 2 Tyrannosaurs, a Dimetrodon, and a Smilodon (sabre-toothed tiger) for a very violent man. Smaller predators might have worked better for him, considering his place in the world. The participant who chose Hyaenodon for Maynard chose Smilodon for Zed, giving them both a big-toothed profile.

The Gimp: Iguanodon and Charonosaurus (silly), Ceratosaurus (vicious), and Anomalocaris (anomalous)--all very interesting sides of his character. Saltopus is an odd choice as a small, fast-moving dinosaur. The choice of Anomalocaris, a Cambrian-era arthropod-like sea creature, is obscure and interesting for the way it casts light on the Gimp's outsider nature.

Lance and Jody: Lance has Dimetrodon, with a spiky fan along its back, a Parasaurolophus, with a horn on its head, a Stegosaurus with its spiky tail, and a horned Triceratops. Jody has 2 horned Triceratops and a Therizinosaurus with its long claws. It is quite possible that this group of dinosaurs, especially Jody's, which share their profusion of long spikes and claws in common, were chosen because those spikes and claws are stand-ins for the long adrenaline needle that was used to revive Jody from her overdose. See also Frank Ginsberg and Luke Skywalker.

Snow White and the Seven Dwarves

Snow White: 2 Tyrannosaurs, which is odd; there could be some backlash against her simple purity; also two pterosaurs, which often imply frailty, 2 sauropods, which again is odd,

and 2 Maiasaura, which is standard for a female character. All together, a lot of repetition, but only some of it makes easy sense, which is surprising, since she has such a simple character.

Dopey: 2 Stegosaurus, which are famous for being dumb, even for a dinosaur. Muttaborrasaurus also has a fairly silly-looking nose.

Grumpy: a few meat-eaters, but less than one might suspect for such a pugnacious character.

Happy: 2 Apatosaurs and a Diplodocus. Is this some sort of size joke?

Sleepy: 2 Ankylosaurus. So he can curl up, as if in a shell, to go to sleep?

Sneezy: Altirhinus for its large nose; probably Parasaurolophus for the same reason.

Bashful: Tyrannosaurus, Rugops, and Dimetrodon; perhaps a series of ironic choices again?

Queen (Beautiful): 3 Tyrannosaurus, 2 Velociraptors, Dilophosaurus, and Therizinosaurus. A very good selection, with subtlety seen through its variety, but also possessing focus by staying all within one general type.

Queen (Ugly): 3 Velociraptors, Compsognathus, Carnotaurus, all violent. Perhaps the Carnotaurus signifies ugliness through the growths on its head. The Compsognathus could represent her smaller size as a crone. She probably doesn't have any Tyrannosaurus because she is not so physically dominant. It is interesting to compare the two Queens, since

their basic character is the same, only enacted under a different shell, so to speak. And yet their dinosaurs are clearly different--the beautiful Queen's are larger and more physical, especially when seen in the participants' pairs, listed here as Beautiful/Ugly: Velociraptor/Compsognathus, Dilophosaurus/Velociraptor, Therizinosaurus/Velociraptor, Tyrannosaurus/Carnotaurus, and finally two Velociraptors. They both are listed as Velociraptors in multiple circumstances, but the Beautiful Queen is always larger (except in the last case where she is equal).

Huntsman: 2 Tyrannosaurus, which perhaps overdoes it a bit. Smaller theropods might be more appropriate for his place in the story.

It must be said that the dinosaurs cast for the seven dwarves are the most disappointing in the project. They--along with the Prince--have some of the most clearly (if simply) defined personalities in the project, and yet they had some of the most random, disconnected sets of dinosaurs. It seems almost like the participants ended up rebelling against the simplicity and tried to find dinosaurs that would play against type or would be more nuanced, but in doing so, spread the results all over the map.

Star Wars

Luke Skywalker: 3 Triceratops, perhaps with the horns standing in for his light saber? It is surprising that there is no more agreement on which dinosaurs would play him. It is harder to find consistency for heroes than it is for villains; there does not seem to be a consensus on a universal "good" dinosaur.

Darth Vader: The most cohesive set of dinosaurs in the whole project: 12 Tyrannosaurus, Acrocanthosaurus, which is also an apex predator, and Allosaurus. They speak for themselves.

Han Solo: 5 Velociraptors, Dilophosaurus, Allosaurus--does this seem extreme? Is he that dangerous? This is another interesting example of a "good guy" with Velociraptors, and also another example like Vega and Winnfield where the character is paid to do what he does; the Velociraptors seem to imply mendacity along with their ferocity. He also has a Pterodactyl and Pteranodon, perhaps because they are flyers, like his Millennium Falcon. The Pachycephalosaurus could imply hard-headedness like Butch Coolidge.

Princess Leia Organa: Several small or female-themed dinosaurs: 2 Maiasaura, 2 Pterodactyls, Troodon, Compsognathus, Microraptor, Oviraptor. She also has two ceratopsians, which may imply her strength and stubbornness.

Ben Obi-Wan Kenobi: 3 sauropods, 2 Triceratops, and 2 Ankylosaurus. The sauropods may have to do with his gravitas, and the last two with his fighting ability. The Eoraptor likely is a reference to his age.

C-3PO: Several silly ones, including Maiasaura (he is also a bit of a gender-bender), Parasaurolophus (x2), Pachycephalosaurus, Hadrosaurus, and Iguanodon.

R2-D2: 4 Compsognathuses due to their size, but also 4 Ankylosaurs, Triceratops, and Centrosaurus for their solidity and toughness.

Chewbacca: 2 Tyrannosaurs, a Therizinosaurus, and an Allosaurus for his imposing and bestial nature. 3 Brachiosaurs and a Supersaur, for his great height. 2 Woolly Mammoths for obvious reasons--an interesting diversion from dinosaurs. His Tyrannosaurs are one of the only examples of a Tyrannosaur being cast for a "good guy."

Thelma and Louise

Thelma: 2 Apatosaurs. Once again, the pattern is there but the meaning is unclear.

Harlan: 3 Velociraptors. The rapist received one of the most unanimous examples of casting, a clear example of unanimous agreement on a dinosaur's persona. However, if it fits him so well, it makes it more difficult for it to fit someone like Han Solo.

J.D.: The Microraptor and Compsognathus are both very small.

Jimmy Dimmick: 2 Stegosaurus. Its unclear what this means unless its because he's trying to protect himself at the end of the movie.

Unforgiven

Ned Logan: Triceratops and Brachyceratops. All he wants is to protect what he's got, in the same way as this defensive-fighting dinosaur.

Little Bill Daggett: He has three very different dinosaurs. Tyrannosaurus, which makes sense due to his strength and viciousness; Chasmosaurus, an armored defender; and Protoceratops, the smallest and most unassuming plant eater.

Schofield Kid: Silesaur, which is a very early dinosaur, standing in for his youth?

English Bob: Dimetrodon and Tyrannosaur. This seems like a character that could be even tougher.

W.W. Beauchamp: 3 predators, even though he's fairly harmless: Compsognathus and Bambiraptor, which make sense, and Rugops, which seems like too much.

The Dinosaurs

The following section attempts to divine the main characteristics of each dinosaur that was given more than one role. The goal is to see what, if anything, links all their performances together. Only those dinosaurs which seem to have at least some kind of cohesive identity are discussed.

Allosaurus: Includes a series of vicious “bad guys” like Signor Ferrari, Marsellus Wallace, and Darth Vader, but also a series of “good guys,” some of whom are fairly innocent and pure like Ellie Sattler and Luke Skywalker, others of whom are more like an antihero, like Han Solo or Iniga Montoya. Allosaurus seems to be able to play both sides of the fence with more ease than Tyrannosaurus, who is more emblematic of evil or at least destruction. Purely innocent characters seem less central to its identity; it seems more at home with the good characters that are hard core, potentially dangerous, or somewhat conflicted, like Robert Muldoon, Obi-Wan Kenobi, Chewbacca, or the Schofield Kid.

Ankylosaurus: There aren’t many discernible patterns in Ankylosaurus’ roles. It mostly plays good guys, but not always. They tend to be strong, physically or mentally. It doesn’t really play dumb characters as asserted in *DHS*. The characters do not seem to need to use the shell as a protective device, or to use the tail as an aggressive weapon. Perhaps this is the difficulty--it is hard to know if people chose it for its offensive or defensive capabilities. The strongest clue to its identity is the four times it was cast for R2-D2--that is a clear indication that it is being used for its low-center-of-gravity, rock-solid, you-can-knock-me-down-but-you-can’t-keep-me-down quality.

Apatosaurus: Mostly seems to be chosen for characters who are big, nice, and old. The advanced age that seems associ-

ated with Apatosaurus is strange but persistent, perhaps tied into a Loch Ness Monster sense of age (with which it shares a long neck). It mostly plays good or at least non-offensive characters, somewhat blandly. There are multiple movies where a large portion of the protagonists are played by Apatosaurus--*Ghost Busters*, *Casablanca*, *Little Miss Sunshine*, *Snow White*, and *Star Wars*. It also plays a fair number of female characters, who have a bit more range than the males, from Ilsa Lund to Delilah Fitzgerald to Thelma. This is interesting because in this project, larger sizes tend to correlate with males, but the Apatosaurus seems to have some inherent female quality.

Archaeopteryx: Its only characters are two young girls, Olive Hoover and Lex Murphy, which provide it with a very clear set of age and gender characteristics that are probably derived from its small, thin look.

Argentinosaurus: It is clearly associated with great size in its relationship with Fezzik.

Brachiosaurus: Very similar to Apatosaurus in some ways, in that it is also often chosen for its size and tends to play good guys. It is also associated with age and authority, such as in Ben Kenobi, John Hammond, and Grandpa Hoover, and also playing those with a certain resolute strength, like Chewbacca, Fezzik, or English Bob.

Caudipteryx: Both of its characters are from *Pulp Fiction*--Fabienne and Jimmy Dimmick--and are chatty, perhaps like a bird. Fabienne seems to fit Caudipteryx perfectly--lean, fragile--but Dimmick seems less connected to it.

Ceratosaurus: Both of its characters are also from *Pulp Fiction*, this time Jules Winnfield and The Gimp. Both are tough

and resolute, but without the majesty and respect of a Tyrannosaurus.

Compsognathus: These characters are often physically small and/or helpless (R2-D2, Olive Hoover, Janine Melnitz, Louis Tully) or sneaky (Ugarte, Dennis Nedry, Vizzini, Prince Humperdinck, W.W. Beauchamp).

Corythosaurus: Louis Tully and C-3PO are both nerdy, dorky characters.

Deinonychus: Largely plays good guys, such as three from *Ghost Busters*, or Butch Coolidge. Not always as savage as one might think--for instance, Sleepy. However, while it seems to be less “evil” than Velociraptor, it is still used for classic Velociraptor characters like Walter Peck, Vincent Vega, Jules Winnfield, and Maynard.

Dilophosaurus: Quick and dangerous, with the danger sometimes lurking underneath the surface, as seen in the Velociraptor from *Jurassic Park*, The (Beautiful) Queen, and Han Solo.

Dimetrodon: Like Ankylosaurus, a popular choice but hard to interpret. Some characters share a certain toughness, like Robert Muldoon, while others seem to be idiosyncratic, highly individual characters, like Frank Ginsberg, Westley, Lance, or Zed, which could tie into the *DHS* “mohawk=rebel” idea. Others are, contrary to its unusual shape, completely normal: the Grandson, Luke Skywalker, Donald Gennaro, most of the Dwarves, Jimmy.

Diplodocus: It is simply worth pointing out that its characters have much less of a clear pattern than other sauropods like Argentinosaurus, Brachiosaurus, and Apatosaurus.

Gallimimus: It is just interesting that the only two instances of Gallimimus are for *Jurassic Park*, which itself featured Gallimimus, a fact that is probably not well-known to the general public due to its obscurity as a species.

Giganotosaurus: Chosen three times to play the Stay-Puft Marshmallow Man due to its “largest theropod” status.

Hadrosaurus: Like Corythosaurus, plays dorky, clutzy, uncentered characters: Egon Spengler, Louis Tully, Janine Melnitz, Walter Peck, Donald Gennaro, Frank Ginsberg, C-3PO.

Iguanodon: A very interesting mix of characters, from the decidedly odd (the Gimp, Captain Koons) to the everyday (Alan Grant, Richard and Sheryl Hoover).

Maiasaura: All but two are female--C-3PO and the Huntsman. The Huntsman seems like an aberration, but C-3PO clearly has gender issues. See the section on female characters, below, for more detail.

Microraptor: Princess Leia and Strawberry Alice suggest a strong, fierce female, but the presence of J.D. seems to fight against that. Interestingly, Olive Hoover is the only one whose size seems to directly relate to the “micro” in its name. Ferrari may be an ironic choice.

Muttaborrasaurus: Plays Dopey and Luke Skywalker, who are both naive.

Ornithomimus: Both Egon Spengler and Louis Tully are somewhat odd and gangly, as with this ostrich-like dinosaur, but Winston the Wolfe doesn't fit into this pattern. See also Struthiomimus.

Oviraptor: The majority are female characters (see their entry, below), with some asexual males like Dennis Nedry, Tim Murphy, and Ugarte that probably were chosen for the same reason. There are also some hyper-male characters, Jules Winnfield and Han Solo. Their inclusion may be due to a possible confusion about Oviraptor's phylogeny, in which people assumed that it was more closely related to Velociraptor..

Pachycephalosaurus: It often plays hard-headed (stubborn) characters like Frank Ginsberg or Butch Coolidge, or big-headed (egotistical) characters like Vizzini, or Han Solo. The Magic Mirror is uniquely "all-head," and C-3PO is both stubborn and egotistical, as well as literally hard-headed because of his metal cranium.

Parasaurolophus: Interestingly, it does not play only dorky characters like the other duckbill dinosaurs, although there are some, like Egon Spengler, Janine Melnitz, Louis Tully, and C-3PO. However, it also plays a wide range of characters, from the everyday (most of the Hoover family), to pure heroes (Luke Skywalker, Prince) to conflicted heroes (Rick Blaine, Westley), and even a few sordid characters (Ugarte, Walter Peck, Lance). It is a much wider range than most plant eaters, especially with its unusual crest, which one would think would limit it. It is either very ambiguous, or just very versatile.

Protoceratops: Plays multiple small characters: Louis Tully, the Murphy children, Grandson, and Little Bill Daggett, plus a few women: Buttercup and Mia Wallace.

Pterodactyl and Pteranodon: Generally speaking, the general public doesn't know the difference between these two. None of these seem to immediately suggest flight or lightness or

speed. It is interesting that in the context of the characters, Pterodactyls and Pteranodons often seem to fit in with the feeling of fierceness that is associated with theropods. However, looked at within their own list of characters, there doesn't seem to be much of a pattern, other than a relation to female characters: Janine Melnitz, Olive Hoover, Snow White, Mia Wallace, Dana Barrett, the Ugly Queen, Princess Leia. As with many other flying dinosaurs, this may come from a sense of physical slowness.

Rugops: A very odd choice for both its characters, Bashful and W.W. Beauchamp. Most of the large theropods are cast for their aggressiveness, but these two characters are both retiring and afraid. Its name means "wrinkle face," which may be related to the idea of worrying and so be applicable after all.

Stegosaurus: Yet another popular dinosaur with a confusing set of characters. As with Ankylosaurus, its mixture of offensive and defensive characteristics may part of the root of the confusion. Most of the characters are protagonists. Some of them fit the description of being "bristly," but by no means all. Its reputation for being a dumb dinosaur doesn't seem to apply to most. It seems to be a well-regarded dinosaur--most of the characters are reasonably honorable or dignified.

Struthiomimus: It plays physically awkward characters like Ian Malcolm, Grumpy, and C-3PO. See also Ornithomimus.

Therizinosaurus: Plays many roles that might be considered to have metaphorically prickly characters, such as Ian Malcolm, Frank Ginsberg, or Prince Humperdinck, or who are dangerous, like Chewbacca and the Beautiful Queen. Jody and Mia Wallace were liked together in *Pulp Fiction* by the

giant adrenaline shot scene, which may tie in to Therizinosaur's claws; it is interesting that both the shot-giver and shot-receiver were both associated with Therizinosaur because of this. Frank Ginsberg's suicide may tie into the same physical characteristic. Therizinosaur seems to be a classic example of how little-known dinosaurs are often cast on the basis of their physical characteristics--and that their casting choices may actually make more sense than more well-known dinosaurs, who are then stuck into any available slot simply because they feel comfortable to the participant.

Triceratops: Almost always the good guy. As with others already mentioned, many of the plant eaters seem to be almost a stand-in for a generic good guy, without necessarily being associated with the dinosaur's characteristics, or at least in an obvious way. It may be simply that the participants chose them for much more complex reasons than can be perceived when looking at large groups of characters. Raymond Stantz' high number of associations with both Triceratops and Stegosaurus seems to be emblematic of this trend. Sometimes Triceratops' horns seem to come into play as stand-ins for the characters' use of long, sharp objects, as with Frank Ginsberg, Lance, Jody, Luke Skywalker, or Ben Kenobi. Triceratops is the second-most-cast dinosaur.

Troodon: Although related to Velociraptor, Troodon has a much-less malicious set of characters. Its reputation for intelligence may be why it is associated with Alan Grant, John Hammond, Ian Malcolm, Winston the Wolfe, or the all-knowing, all-seeing Magic Mirror (Troodons also have large eyes).

Tyrannosaurus: Theropods, on the other hand, seem to play fairly specific characters, or at least groups of characteristics. The Tyrannosaurus is always powerful and immense in its

influence. Usually it is portrayed as the ultimate enemy, such as Darth Vader, Major Strasser, Little Bill Daggett, Marsellus Wallace, Walter Peck, or the Stay-Puft Marshmallow Man. As described above, it usually creates its power a force of nature and the personality of the character rather than act as an authority that derives its power from its position in a system, although that is not always the case. Sometimes it also plays protagonists that contain the same sense of implacability, such as Rick Blaine, Peter Venkman, Butch Coolidge, Louise, or Bill Munny. In any case, Tyrannosaurus clearly has a separate role from that of other large theropods like Allosaurus and Carnotaurus, which lack its grandeur and place in society; however, they tend to have more of a sense of individual identity than the Tyrannosaurus' archetypal existence. Tyrannosaurus are clearly more direct and brutal than the guileful and shadowy Velociraptor. Tyrannosaurus is the most-cast dinosaur, although it is not ahead by as far a margin as it is in some other projects.

Utahraptor: Chosen, because of its size, for the Velociraptor part in Jurassic Park, but also for Vincent Vega (who was also played by a Velociraptor).

Velociraptor: One of the more problematic dinosaurs to analyze, as discussed above. On the one hand it plays pure, manipulative evil in a way that Tyrannosaurus, for instance, rarely does. Tyrannosaurus usually commands respect and does things out in the open, and out of a motive for power. Velociraptor is more malicious, more hidden, more individual. However, it also occasionally plays "good" characters. This is not a problem in itself, as other theropods like Allosaurus and Tyrannosaurus do this as well. However, they incarnate their power and aggressiveness in different ways. Velociraptor is aggressive and fierce like the large theropods, but embodies malice in a way that is hard to disconnect. This

could be seen as the “Harlan vs. Han” problem. Harlan is not evil in a cartoony or draconian way, but in a very real, human way. Velociraptors seem to be seen as very akin to ourselves--see how they were used in *Jurassic Park* to represent human-like intelligence and society. So when they are then used to play Han Solo, in this case only because of their intelligence and guile, it seems as if some issues are not being fully dealt with. A Deinonychus, for instance, might work better; it has less cultural weight, it seems less reptilian, and might be able to at least consider the possibility of honor. Even a comparison of Velociraptor and Deinonychus skulls seems to bear this out--the Velociraptor skull has a longer snout with hints of a trickster-like fox, or a snake. Deinonychus is heavier, more like contemporary predators like cats or wolves. Velociraptor is the third-most-cast dinosaur. Tyrannosaurus, Triceratops, and Velociraptor are all clustered fairly closely together; after that there is quite a drop before the next-most-popular cluster of dinosaurs (Apatosaurus, Ankylosaurus, and Stegosaurus, which are all tied). See the graph in the *Species-a-Rama!* book for details.

Woolly Mammoth: The only non-dinosaur to be mentioned more than once, the Woolly Mammoth was obviously appropriately cast twice for Chewbacca, who it matches in both size and hirsuteness.

Popularity of Different Species

The order of the usage of different species is approximately the same as in other projects, with Tyrannosaurus, Triceratops, and Velociraptor in a cluster at the top, followed by Apatosaurus, Ankylosaurus, and Stegosaurus, then by Compsognathus, Parasaurolophus, and Dimetrodon. After them there is somewhat of a drop-off in usage.

The main difference between this and other popularity lists is that normally the Stegosaurus and Velociraptor would

(more or less) switch places. This is the only project where Velociraptor is so popular. In other projects, Chris has wondered at the relative lack of popularity for Velociraptor, considering the way they exploded into pop culture with *Jurassic Park*. Perhaps the reason they are so popular in this project is because the subject matter is movies, and it brought *Jurassic Park* to the participants' minds.

The relatively high use of Therizinosaurus, Troodon, Oviraptor, and Maiasaura was particularly surprising, and perhaps indicates a larger presence for them in the cultural awareness than Chris guessed.

Looking at the list of the dinosaurs that were repeatedly cast for the same role (the list only shows those who were cast 3 times or more, since being cast 2 times could too easily be a coincidence), one can see that half of the roles were played by Tyrannosaurus and Velociraptor, which clearly have a lock on the imagination of the public. All of the characters that were cast with the same dinosaur 5 or more times were either Tyrannosaurus or Velociraptor. Ankylosaurus, Compsognathus, and Triceratops each had roles for which they were cast 4 times each. Tyrannosaurus and Velociraptor were both multiply-cast for 5 different roles each; no other dinosaur was multiply-cast for more than 2 roles (Triceratops, Stegosaurus, and Apatosaurus, which correlates with the overall casting list).

Darth Vader had more than twice as many as anyone else. All of the top 7 roles, and 11 of the top 20, were from *Ghost Busters* and *Star Wars*. These results speak simultaneously to the popularity of those movies and the hold they have on our minds, while also saying something about their characters, which are very archetypal, and yet specific, providing people with a very clear sense of who they are.

The multiply-cast roles were split fairly evenly between heroes and villains. Three of the top four were bad guys. The villains tended to be the big bad villain, while the heroes sometimes included second or third string heroes (R2-D2). Only one bit player, the Grandfather, was in the list.

Some of the interesting character/dinosaur pairings of note in this list include Darth Vader's chart-topping 12 Tyrannosaurs, as already noted, and Han Solo and Walter Peck's 5 Velociraptors each. There were also several characters who were, surprisingly, on the list *twice*: R2-D2's 4 Ankylosaurs and 4 Compsognathuses; the Stay-Puft Marshmallow Man's 4 Tyrannosaurs and 3 Giganotosaurs; Raymond Stantz' 4 Triceratops and 3 Stegosaurs; and the Queen, whose Beautiful incarnation had 3 Tyrannosaurs and whose Ugly avatar had 3 Velociraptors.

Most of the dinosaurs that only had one role are fairly random and it is not surprising that they were not chosen more than once; it is a testament to the participants' initiative that they used them at all.

Dinosaurs Playing Specific Demographics

Chris chose the movies for this project partly so that we could see if people would assign different dinosaurs to different demographic groups, such as those defined by race, gender, or age.

In order to examine how people would cast dinosaurs in relation to race, Chris specifically chose movies with multiple black characters so that they could be compared to each other as well as to the main pool of characters.

Out of the 52 dinosaurs chosen to play black characters, 17 were Tyrannosaurs, 5 Triceratops, 4 Dimetrodons, 3 Ve-

lociraptors, 3 Apatosaurs, 2 Ankylosaurs, and 2 Allosaurs. Looking at them in groups rather than genera, there were 23 large theropods, 6 ceratopsians, 5 sauropods, 5 small theropods, and 2 pterosaurs. This might seem to indicate a degree of race-specific casting because of its repetition, especially in the theropods, but it is unclear. The 12 Tyrannosaurs for James Earl Jones' Darth Vader throw it for a loop, and certain some examples of multiple-dinosaur-casting would be expected in any group. If anything, the large number of large and small theropods can be seen as related to the number of bad guys played by black characters, a factor attributed to Hollywood, not dinosaurs. As noted before, evil characters were easier to "typecast" than good characters, so it is to be expected that theropods would make up the majority in any list.

If we look at them in terms of how many characters had at least one of these dinosaurs, as opposed to how many dinosaurs were there total (including multiple castings for each character), the numbers become even more vague: 4 of 7 characters were played at least once by Tyrannosaurus, 4 of 7 were played by Triceratops, 2 of 7 were played by Allosaurus, 2 of 7 were played by Apatosaurus, 2 of 7 were played by Dimetrodon, 1 of 7 by Velociraptor, and 1 of 7 by Ankylosaurus. Looking at them in groups, 6 of 7 were played by some large theropod, 4 of 7 by some kind of ceratopsian, 3 of 7 by a sauropod, 2 of 7 by a pterosaur, and 2 of 7 by a small theropod. These are probably fairly standard statistics for any group.

Gender is a different matter. Certain dinosaurs were used to portray female characters at a high percentage rate, and the connections between the dinosaurs and gender are more obvious.

10 of the 20 female characters were portrayed at least once by a Maiasaura, the “good mother lizard.” This makes sense, but Chris was somewhat surprised that it, and the meaning of its name, were so well known. It does also tend to stereotype the female characters and put the entire weight of their character on their gender--the male characters were not chosen on the basis of a dinosaur known for its fathering skills!

It does seem that the female characters represented by Maiasaura do tend to be at least a little more “motherly” than the female characters that were not represented by Maiasaura. Dana Barrett, Janine Melnitz, Olive Hoover, Mia Wallace, Honey Bunny, Jody, the Queen, Thelma, and Strawberry Alice are all non-mothering types for various reasons. Snow White is the sole surprise on the non-Maiasaura list. (Which is not to say that all the Maiasaura women are mothering types, but they do tend to have somewhat softer, “traditional” female roles.)

Oviraptor was also predominantly chosen for female characters (7), presumably due to its relation to eggs.

The female list also includes 4 Pteranodons, 5 Pterodactyls, 10 Velociraptors, 9 Compsognathuses, and 3 Protoceratops. (This last one is much more impressive when you realize that only 7 Protoceratops were cast in total.)

As with the black characters, the repetition of some of these dinosaurs is to be expected in any group. However, while any group might be expected to include, for instance, multiple Triceratops, the proportionately large numbers of flying reptiles and Compsognathuses sticks out; these may have been associated with females due to their relatively svelte body structures. There were 17 flying animals in total, including reptiles and bird-like forms.

The dinosaurs chosen to play children were often chosen specifically for their small size: 3 Compsognathuses, 2 Archaeopteryx, 1 Gallimimus, 4 Protoceratops, 1 Pterodactyl, 1 Microraptor, and 1 Troodon combine to be more than half of the of the 25 roles for children. Silesaurus, a very early dinosaur, played a child, probably due to the notion of early=youth.

Older characters were not cast based on their ages as obviously as young characters, but there does seem to be an influence. The biggest correlation seems to be the 7 Apatosaurs and 5 Brachiosaurus, out of 50 total dinosaurs, cast for older characters. As already discussed, the reason they might represent old age is unclear, but it may have to do with the idea of slow growth over a long period of time, like a tree. Eoraptor, one of the earliest dinosaurs, was probably chosen on the basis of its age, which is interesting when seen alongside the similar decision for Silesaurus. Geologically, they both belong to a “young” earth, but compared to us they are relatively older than other dinosaurs. Therefore, depending on how you look at it, they could represent both youth and age.

There was not a lot of unusual casting for nonhuman characters, although there were a fair number of Tyrannosaurs--10 out of 69, plus another 10 large theropods. The only non-human character that was never cast as a Tyrannosaur was C-3PO (even R2-D2 was cast as a T. rex!).

Speciation

It is interesting to look at the movies and see how many different species each movie utilized. In a sense, you could say that each movie had a different degree of speciation depending on its cultural environment. It turned out that some of the effects of speciation could be predicted by statistics and some were more based on cultural interpretation.

If one defines uniqueness as having only one instance of a dinosaur within a particular movie, then generally the more total parts that were cast for a movie, the less unique species it would have. “Total parts” means the number of characters in a movie multiplied by the number of people who filled out that movie. This effect is predictable, because it basically means that people only know so many dinosaurs, and after a time they will begin to repeat themselves. The size of the pie charts make it fairly clear that this predicted pattern does exist, with some exceptions. *Pulp Fiction* was cast with many dinosaurs, and yet has the 3rd highest percentage of unique dinosaurs, and the highest number in absolute numbers. While the other 3 movies with the highest number of cast dinosaurs are also have the 3 highest numbers of unique dinosaurs in absolute numbers, they are the lowest by percentage. *Unforgiven* stands far above the rest. This is partly due to its very low number of cast dinosaurs, but it is significantly higher than even *Thelma and Louise*, which has the same number of cast dinosaurs.

However, if one defines uniqueness as having the only instance of a dinosaur anywhere within the entire project, then suddenly we see a different effect--some movies seem to have attracted the casting of unique species more than others, based more on the character of the movie than anything else. In this case, *Pulp Fiction* easily takes off with the highest percentage of unique dinosaurs, followed by *Unforgiven*, after which there is another gap before the rest. Both of these movies have very sharply defined but unique characters, and it is not surprising that they attracted the appropriate kinds of dinosaurs. In absolute numbers, *Pulp Fiction*, *Ghost Busters*, and *Snow White and the Seven Dwarves* attracted the most unique dinosaurs.

The big surprise is *Little Miss Sunshine*, which has fairly

unique characters, but no unique dinosaurs. *Thelma and Louise* also has no unique dinosaurs, but its characters--while sharply drawn and more evocative than normal--are reasonably close to normal dramatic characters, and so would not presuppose the need for unique dinosaurs.

Overview

The project gained a lot of enthusiasm from its participants, but finding participants was difficult since they needed to know a lot about movies *and* a lot about dinosaurs. Letting participants use internet research to help themselves on either topic ended up being a very successful solution.

A reasonably large number of the dinosaur/character matchups make sense and evoke interesting ideas about either the dinosaur or the character through their pairing. Some other casting decisions make less obvious sense.

The difficulty in interpreting the results comes from the fact that the participants may have been thinking about fairly obscure characteristics about either the dinosaur or the character when making their matches, so it is hard to say definitively that a particular dinosaur just doesn't make sense for a role.

As a whole, however, the project clearly proved that we do tend to think of dinosaurs--at least certain dinosaurs--as having particular personalities, and that these personalities are similar to those found in movies, which are in turn the same as in other basic human narratives. The question is, how can our understanding of dinosaurs be used to further our understanding of the narratives we have created for ourselves?
